The merger is designed to help face the daunting challenge of meeting the projected 12% annual growth in increasingly complex demands over the next 15 years. These challenges are all the greater given what the Royal Commission long ago identified as a chronically underfunded social care environment.

The synergies between Kisharon and Langdon were always abundantly clear: we both empower Jewish people with learning disabilities and autistic people to achieve independence and live their best lives. By coming together, we present an accessible pathway to families, offering their children a seamless transition through all the key stages of education and on into supported living and employment. Over a wider geographical area, we can now serve a greater number of people who wish to access higher standards of Jewish services.

We have the team capable of delivering support to meet the ambitious aspirations of the growing numbers in our community who need us today, and in generations to come. "I am visually impaired and struggle with reading and writing. As a child, opportunities to meet other people with learning disabilities, especially Jewish people, were very limited.

At 16, I joined the Langdon Brady youth club, and suddenly my social circle expanded like never before.

I then moved into a shared Langdon house, receiving support with cooking, cleaning and getting ready for work.

Over time, as I grew in confidence, I felt I was ready to leave the 24/7 wrap-around care of the shared house, and this year I have moved into a flat with my friend Sarah.

Sarah and I still receive some support, but our journey epitomises Kisharon Langdon's work. From shy teenagers who felt inhibited by our learning disabilities, we are now grown-up women, living our lives with a level of independence we never thought possible."

Stronger together

The merger has created a far larger, broader service, which is attractive to skilled practitioners, and appealing to local authority commissioners. Economies of scale will enable us to invest 13.5% more of donor monies into our frontline services, which is important to an increasingly impact-conscious funder community. All this will build our resilience in the long term, by giving us a bigger supporter base and a more secure footing. However, while we can realise some efficiencies, a broader service increases our costs, while local authority funding consistently fails to keep pace.
